BASIC VIDEO EDITING TIPS CHS ONLINE AND DISTANCE LEARNING, FALL 2019

- 1. Keep it simple—if you know how to do more than basic editing, that's fine, but there is no reason to stress out about the process.
- 2. You may have a built-in video editor on your computer, such as iMovie, Windows Movie Maker, or the like.
 - a. These are basic editors that will let you stitch clips together, add titles, add transitions, and adjust audio levels.
- 3. If you have a Mac, use iMovie. It comes with most new Macs.
- 4. If you have a Windows machine, use Movie Maker—it can be downloaded for free from Microsoft.com.
- 5. There are many other software programs available to choose from...too many to make any recommendations, as they vary in skill level, price, and available functions.

STANDARD PROCESS STEPS

- 1. IMPORT VIDEO CLIPS: You must import your video clips into your video editor first—you may be able to drag and drop them or use the menus to find the Import command.
- 2. SAVE PROJECT: Before you begin editing, save your project using your name and assignment in the title (SmithBetty Assignment1, for example).
- 3. DRAG CLIPS TO TIMELINE: Once imported, you will drag and drop clips to the timeline, in the order you want them. The timeline is where you can make edits, add titles, etc.
 - a. If you need training on how to use your video editing software, ISU has InLearning (formerly Lynda.com). Find this in Sign Ons on the ISU home page.
 - b. Search in InLearning for the software program you wish to learn.
- 4. KEEP SAVING: Save your project as you go, especially after editing is complete!
- 5. PRODUCE YOUR FINISHED VIDEO: When finished editing, you must publish/produce your video as an .mp4.
 - a. The software likely has default settings, which should make it easy for you.
- 6. UPLOAD: Once produced, you must upload it into your Studio folder in Canvas (see how to use Studio for Students).
- 7. LINK: After uploading, you must then link to your video from the assignment page.
