
## BASIC VIDEO RECORDING TIPS CHS ONLINE AND DISTANCE LEARNING, FALL 2019


## PREPARATION

- 1. LIGHT: makes videos easier to see and helps the image stay in focus.
  - a. Lighting placed 45 degrees to the side and 45 degrees above usually produces the best results, and reduces glare on those who wear glasses.
  - b. Avoid recording subjects with a bright background (i.e. windows or bright lights).
- 2. DISTANCE: Get close enough to the presenter or speaker to capture audio. If you can't hear very well, the microphone won't be much better.
- 3. INTERVIEWS:
  - a. Find a quiet place to record if possible.
  - b. Interviewees should repeat questions in their answer. (Ex: You ask, 'What is your name?' They answer, 'My name is Mike Smith', rather than just, 'Mike Smith'.)
- 4. ANGLES AND FRAMING
  - a. Try not to record people from below—it is an unflattering angle.
  - b. Think of frames in terms of 'rule of thirds'—broken into thirds on the horizontal and the vertical, as seen in the illustrations below.
  - c. For presentations, record mostly straight on. The subject's head should be framed slightly above the middle square.

- d. Have interviewees look at you, not the camera (like in news interviews).
- e. In the example below, the interviewee is framed slightly to the side, looking left at the interviewer. (The interviewer would be on the right of the camera.)



## RECORDING

- 1. Slow panning (moving from side to side) or zooming in or out is nice if done smoothly and not too often.
  - a. Don't pan too fast, or move around too much. This can make people dizzy.
- 2. Lean against something to steady the video if possible.
- 3. If you are trying to edit in-camera, stay on each clip for 5-10 seconds before pausing.
- 4. If editing afterwards, record clips for a longer time. You can cut out the excess later.
- 5. Remember that a projector screen is very bright, and can make your subjects look dark by comparison—record one or the other unless there is adequate lighting in the room.
